

Editors' Foreword

We are delighted to present to our readers the first issue of *Études phénoménologiques – Phenomenological Studies*.

This bilingual journal comes in the wake of the former *Études phénoménologiques*, which was founded in 1985 by Jacques Taminiaux who remained its editor until it ceased publication in 2008. Our new journal follows the same spirit of openness to diverse trends in phenomenology. It aims at reflecting the fruitful debates between phenomenology and other current trends in philosophy. It further aspires to be a forum for discussing the relevance and originality of phenomenology in dealing with questions that currently occupy the philosophical scene. The journal lastly aims at being a site of encounter between historical studies of particular figures or topics in phenomenology, on the one hand, and systematic treatments of problems to which phenomenology can contribute, on the other.

The journal strongly encourages spontaneous submissions of articles in the broad field of its editorial project and welcomes a diversity of phenomenological topics. Even when an issue is organized around a theme, as is the first one, the journal will accept articles on other topics, which will be published in a “Varia” section.

Études phénoménologiques – Phenomenological Studies will be published once a year in the dual format now current in philosophy: on-line on the website of Peeters Publishers and in print.

After a preliminary editorial examination in order to ensure conformity with the journal's goals, each submission will be sent to two scholars for anonymous review. Every other year starting in 2018 the journal will publish the list of the reviewers for the previous and the current year (thus, the issue of 2018 will list the reviewers for the 2017 and 2018 issues).
